

PARLIAMENT HOUSE OWNER OPENING TWO LOCATIONS

A new sign went up last month at the vacant M Lounge property located at 2000 N. Orange Avenue, in Ivanhoe Village, bearing a familiar name. The sign reads "Parliament House Ivanhoe" and according to local business owners, people have been coming and going from the property for weeks.

M Lounge closed back in 2022 amidst some tax hullabaloo with the owner, Tim Majors. At the time, the building was allegedly seized by one of the lenders, with some of the vehicles on display inside being sold to private investors. The building has sat empty

We told you back in July 2021 that longtime Parliament House owner, Don Granatstein, was looking to open a new location for the shuttered (and beloved) Parliament House brand in the heart of downtown Orlando, in partnership with Tim Garito, owner of Game Room and Sly Fox. The duo set their sights on the former home of the CitvArts Factory at 29 S. Orange Avenue, at the corner of Pine Street and Orange Avenue, but the project stalled shortly after remodeling began.

Recently, we were informed that construction has now ramped back up and the club could be open as early as this July.

The original building permit for the downtown Parliament House project expired on July 26, 2023, and according to a Parliament House rep, it took some time to line up new approvals from the City, given the current moratorium on new nightclubs in the downtown. The downtown project will include the recently vacated SAK Comedy Lab space as the new home of the Footlight Theater (the name of the theater space at the original Parliament House location which hosted regular theatrical productions and drag shows). Plans also call for a rooftop bar on the third and fourth floors of the building. Pom Moongauklang, the award-winning owner of Pom Pom's Sandwicheria and Teahouse, has shared that she is in talks for leading the food programming at both locations.

A larger timeline for the new Ivanhoe project is still not public, with Granatstein sharing publicly that his team may have been too hasty in the erection of the sign.

The million-dollar Parliament House motor inn was designed by architect Alan Berman and Hodes and Cummin and, at the time, was seen as a major win for Orlando and the surrounding neighborhoods. It was the only motel within city limits to have a swimming pool, a cabana club and putting greens, a lakefront beach, an onsite restaurant, and a cocktail lounge and when it opened on January 15, 1962, there were hundreds of people lining up to tour the property, according to reports by Orlando Evening Star.

Parliament House was the first in what was expected to be a national chain of hotels along the lines of Holiday Inn but hit a mouse-shaped roadblock in 1971 when Walt Disney opened his theme parks outside of city limits. The parks completely shifted

tourists out of downtown Orlando and over to Lake Buena Vista, where hundreds of new hotels were popping up faster than greedy seagulls at a beachside picnic.

In the shadow of The Mouse, Orange Blossom Trail fast became an out-of-the-way periphery of the family-friendly tourist corridor, where more illicit activities could thrive. The smell of orange blossoms was replaced by the smell of car exhaust and cheap cologne, and Parliament House slumped into disrepair, like a fat old man asleep in his recliner, covered in crumbs and regret. Yet, miraculously, the hotel was purchased by Michael Hodge and Bill Miller in 1975, wealthy queer investors who saw potential in transforming the sad hotel property into a fabulous new gay-geared venue.

Under their stewardship, Parliament House went from a bankrupt hotel to a thriving gay resort and entertainment hub, with multiple bars onsite and a disco room. The hotel rooms went from hosting vacationing families in the '70s to closeted businessmen and people looking for a good, albeit quick, time.

WHAT HAPPENED TO ALL THE LOVEBUGS?



Lovebugs (Plecia nearctica), sometimes called honeymoon flies or "yuck, it's in my mouth," are a species of Bibionidae or march fly that Ilive in some parts of Central America and the southeastern United States.

Lovebugs are small, black flies with red thoraxes that measure about 1/4-inch long and they're related to mosquitoes and gnats, but aren't the best fliers which is why you'll mostly see them haphazardly clinging to any surface they land on. Like your coffee cup or

Lovebugs traditionally appear twice a year, in clouds, joined at the abdomen, in a last-minute orgy of epic proportions. And people hate them. The reason people aren't really starting a lovebug fan page any time soon is that semi-annually, these harmless little black and red specs can swarm in the millions, joined butt-to-butt, flying around between April and May, like massive, flittering, orgiastic clouds.

They are spread over a large geographical area, in a range of habitats from the southern tip of Mexico and Central America, around the Gulf across the southern states and into

The larvae eat rotten vegetation and the adults feed on nectar, from plants like goldenrod, Brazilian pepper, and sweet clover, but they only tend to live three or four days when fully grown.

Their bodies become super acidic if left to stew on your car, and can leave pits and marks in car paint if not removed quickly. And they're oddly attracted to car fumes and hot asphalt, which makes roads and highways the perfect place to find them.

Nobody can really agree on where they came from but despite a pervasive urban myth, they did not, in fact, originate in a lab as a result of some randy insect scientist experiment, but rather migrated into Florida from our neighboring southerly states.

Lovebugs don't really do anything to anyone besides indiscriminately screw on your face, hair, and in your glass of wine (or where

ever they happen to land) and they don't bite or sting humans. They don't carry disease either. They just like to get it on in the road and die in large numbers in the spring so you have to wash your car every day; which is why they're not really a high priority for the State to step in and try to control their numbers like they do with mosquitoes.

But this year, the bugs were nowhere to be seen, and people can't seem to agree on an explanation.

Scientists and institutions are finding it almost impossible to find funding for a study, to look into the lovebug disappearance, as the bugs don't really have any sort of palpable impact on the Florida ecosystem. They don't really compete against any endemic insects for food or habitat, and they don't really have any benefits either. They don't bite or sting. Changes in climate has been ruled out as Florida has incredibly diverse microclimates across the state and they seem to have vanished equally in all of them.

Some fingers are pointing at some unkown parasite or illness, but without funding to dissect and study the remaining population, there's not much that can be done.

Some scientists are pointing to an overall Insect Apocalypse, citing that 40% of all insect species are in decline around the world.

THERE ARE A NUMBER OF **ENDANGERED INSECTS TO BE FOUND IN FLORIDA**

Insects are a vital part of the planet's ecosystems, and their decline could harm the entire structure of the natural world, by shifting entire food

Insects are the most diverse group of animals on Earth, making up 80% of all animal life. However, their numbers and diversity are declining due to climate change, pollution, and habitat loss.

Insects are responsible for important tasls like:

- **POLLINATION -- Most plants and** animals rely on food that has been pollinated by insects.
- PEST CONTROL Predatory insects like ladybugs and wasps eat pesky insects that can damage crops.

There are a handful of endangered insects that call Florida home, including the Miami Blue Butterfly (below), the Schaus Swallowtail Butterfly, and the intertideal firefly.

WINTER PARK CRA OFFERING STUDENT WORK PROGRAM WITH LOCAL NON-PROFITS

The City of Winter Park's Community Redevelopment Agency has just launched its 2024 Summer Youth Enrichment Program that places students in paid internships with local, non-profit organizations to gain hands-on work experience while giving back to the community.

This program is offered to high schoolaged students who live within the Community Redevelopment Agency district. Access the CRA Boundary map to check your address for eligibility. Students interested in participating must be a high school student between the ages of 14-18 and have written approval from a parent or guardian.

Interns work an eight-week period and are paid a maximum of 20 hours per week, with duties changing depending on the participating organization. All required paperwork must be submitted to the Winter Park Community Center by Friday, April 26, at 5 p.m.



CITY COUNCIL APPROVES **INCENTIVES FOR NEW** ENTERTAINMENT DISTRICT

Orlando Magic has been planning to build a massive entertainment district project adjacent to the Kia Center since 2011, and they say if they get enough incentives from the City of Orlando, they could begin construction by the end of the year.

The ambitious \$500 million, 8.4-acre mixeduse project calls for a 260-room full-service hotel with 16,000 SF of Class A office space, 270 residential units, 125,000 SF of retail, a 3,500-person live event venue, a town square, and 1,100 new parking spaces.

Orlando City Council voted on the proposed incentive agreement that would grant them \$2.5 million for building a new conference center and up to \$40 million in returned property taxes over ten years through the Community Redevelopment Agency, for the project's first phase of development. It must include 10 affordable housing units and a Parramore business incubator to qualify.



FDOT IS HANDING OVER SUNRAIL FINANCIALS TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS

The Florida Department of Transportation will be handing over the financial responsibility of running SunRail to Orlando and the counties it serves by December 31, 2024.

Transitioning the financial burden of operating SunRail has been the plan since its conception, with each government serviced by the train to pay a share based on the number of stations and how many passengers are boarding and leaving them, a plan that leaves Orlando paying for about a third of the costs. When SunRail first launched, operation costs were estimated to be around \$8 million a year. Since the launch, those costs have risen dramatically. The 2022-23 fiscal year saw the service bring in roughly \$40.8 million with a cost of roughly \$76 million.

LYNX is scheduled to take control of SunRail operations by the end of 2027, under the auspices of the Central Florida Commuter Rail Commission – formed by Volusia, Seminole, Orange, and Osceola counties and the City of Orlando.



REGINA HILL APPEALS INJUNCTION AGAINST HER LOSES

Suspended City Commissioner, Regina Hill, is appealing a judge's decision to restrict her access to an elderly constituent's finances after being accused of exploiting the private funds for her personal benefit.

Hill was suspended from her seat on Orlando City Council following a felony indictment on seven charges related to fraud and elder abuse, to which she pleaded not guilty.

Hill is accused of exploiting a 96-year-old woman in her district and allegedly spending over \$100,000 of her savings on things like makeup, new teeth, vitamin injections, a facelift, a trip to Miami, and using her as a co-signer on a new home. An Orange County judge ordered a permanent injunction to keep Hill away from the woman's property and finances late last month.

The judge denied Hill's appeal for a rehearing.

Hill is scheduled to stand trial for criminal charges on July 22.





FROM SHOW FOLLOWING PUBLIC COMPLAINTS

The team at City Arts in downtown Orlando were in hot water this past week when it became public that a piece of art submitted to a group show there was not created by the artist but rather, it was made using artificial intelligence. The piece, titled "Mick Jagger," was submitted to The Art of Rock and Roll show, with a price tag of \$3,500. The medium was described as "handmade digital art" but once it became apparent to other participating artists in the show that "handmade" meant "handtyped" word got out. Comments in social media drew the attention of City Arts staff who joined in on online forums to say they were not aware that the piece wasn't human-made and the decision was made to remove the piece from the show. A video of the piece's removal from the wall was also posted on social media for added veracity. Some artists are asking that CityArts officially ban any Al submissions from future shows.

OMA'S 2024 FLORIDA PRIZE EXHIBITION OPENS MAY 31

This year's Florida Prize in Contemporary Art at Orlando Museum of Art is scheduled to open on May 31 for the tenth consecutive year

The Florida Prize in Contemporary Art, organized by the Orlando Museum of Art (OMA), brings new recognition to the state's most progressive artists. Each year, OMA's curatorial team surveys artists working throughout the State before inviting ten to participate. One artist will receive a \$20,000 award made possible with the generous support of local philanthropists Gail and Michael Winn. The artist selected to receive the Prize will be announced at the opening party. Guests will have the opportunity to cast a "People's Choice" vote for their favorite artist, which includes a \$2,500 award.

The selected artists for the 2024 exhibition include Mona Bozorgi, Tallahassee, FL; Yanira Collado, Miami, FL; Bernadette Despujols,

Miami, FL; Sheila Goloborotko, Jacksonville, FL; Njeri Kinuthia, Orlando, FL; Boy Kong, Orlando, FL; Francesco Lo Castro, Miami, FL Carol Prusa, Miami, FL; Jason Seifeat th, Miami, FL, Onajide Shabaka, Miami, FL.

Artists range from emerging to mid-career, often with distinguished records of exhibitions and awards that reflect recognition at national and international levels. In all cases, they are artists who explore significant ideas of art and culture in original and visually exciting ways.

The exhibition opening Preview Party will be on Friday, May 31, 2024, from 6-9 p.m. featuring a sampling of Central Florida's most popular cateriers, with dishes that were inspired by one of the ten Florida Prize artists.

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
THE 2024 ORLANDO **FRINGE FESTIVAL**

The Orlando International Fringe Theatre Festival is annual 14-day cultural event that takes place in Loch Haven Park and nearby venues, and features over 2,000 ticketed performances across genres. The fest also includes free programming like an outdoor beer garden and music festival, Visual Fringe, and Kids Fringe for

The 2024 festival will take place from May 15–27, with a ribbon cutting and ceremony on May 14. The festival includes a Local Artist Teaser Show on April 15, and a Patrons Pick Day and Closing Ceremonies on May 27.

The fest is a marathon of creativity with performers and storytellers from around the world descending on Ivanhoe Village. It can be overwhelming for newbies to dive in and find a rhythm, but the best thing to do, at least according to the Bungalower offices, is to head to the two-week food truck/beer garden in the heart of Loch Haven Park, grab a drink, and have a seat at one of the cheap plastic tables covered in theater flyers. There are free outdoor performances on the outdoor stage most nights and some amazing festival food, like from our friends at Jimmy Bear's BBO. Ask people about their favorite shows and take it from there.

But in the effort of empowering you with as much knowledge as possible, here are some Fringe tips and a roundup of some of shows that have caught our attention - SOME DESCRIPTIONS ARE TAKEN FROM THE FRINGE GUIDE.



Loch Haven Park is home to a number of arts institutions like The Shakes, Orlando Family Stage, Orlando Museum of Art, Orlando Garden Club, and Orlando Science Center. The museum, the Garden Club, and the two theatrical companies in the park all house performances throughout the festival but the main hub and ticketing center

Even if you are familiar with the campus, all of the names of the venues are changed for the Fest and are color-coded. Each individual theater in the buildings is given a specific color and you'll need to know that to find your corresponding show.

Offsite venues this year include the Renaissance Theatre Company, located at 415 E. Princeton Street next to Advent Health, The Starlite Room at Savoy Orlando on Orange Avenue, Stardust Lounge, and CityArts.





DOG-LOVING MUSCULAR HUNK HEADED TO ORLANDO



CENTRAL FLORIDA-BASED TIJUANA FLATS FILES FOR CHAPTER 11 BANKRUPTCY

Tijuana Flats, a Central Florida-based Tex-Mex brand, has announced that it had filed for Chapter 11 bankruptcy.

The company also coupled the announcement with the news that it would be closing 11 of its restaurants almost immediately, one of which was located in Virginia Beach, Virginia, and another ten in Florida, including some in Jacksonville, Boynton Beach, and Orlando – though the exact stores are yet to be announced.

The company's new owners, Flatheads, LLC., shared in a statement that the decision to declare bankruptcy and cut low-performing locations was made in order to "preserve the organization," saying "immediate action was needed.

Tijuana Flats opened its first location in Winter Park in 1995 and currently has over 91 restaurants in four states.

Former CEO Brian Wheeler sold the company back in 2015, and has since launched a new concept with his son that he's called "Big Taco." The flagship location is expected too pen in Casselberry this November.

Big Taco is expected to be a made-to-order Tex Mex restaurant serving made-to-order tacos, tostada salads, chimichangas, and more, with a nugget of the magic Wheeler created in the early days of Tijuana Flats.

Once open, the concept will fall to Wheeler's son Jake, who has been working with the family's Tibby's New Orleans Kitchen for the past few years.

The new 2,000 SF flagship Big Taco restaurant will be located at 1455 State Road 436, Unit 117, and is expected to have an "old Las Vegas" feel. Hiring is expected to start this

The Ravenous Pig in Winter Park launched an ambitious renovation last June that was expected to last just the summer but almost one full year later, the work has finally been completed.

The Michelin-recognized restaurant was almost completely redone by South Florida design firm, Anna Woodman Interior Design and Blankenship Architects.

The shop also features a Cannabis Lounge bar area that is open to the general public, no medical marijuana card needed, where they serve Delta-THC-infused cocktails and gummies.

Dolce, a "Roaring 20's-themed dessert bar and restaurant," opened in November 2021 in the former home of Eden's Fresh at 500 E. Central Boulevard by Lake Eola

The restaurant hosted us for our 281st episode of "Bungalower and The Bus" in July 2022, but went silent in November 2023. At the time, we reached out to the owner, Christopher Buxton, who told us that, "Dolce has not closed permanently. All I can say at the moment is we are correcting some issues to open back up."

Fast-forward this spring, when Buxton confirmed that the restaurant has indeed closed, with the following message.

"It is with a heavy heart that we announce the closure of Dolce in Thornton Park. This decision was not made lightly, and we want to express our deep gratitude to our loyal customers, dedicated staff, and the community that embraced us over the past couple of years. Running a restaurant has always been a labor of love for us. Unfortunately, several factors have converged, making it increasingly difficult to sustain our business in this challenging environment. We want to express our deepest gratitude to our incredible staff, whose hard work and dedication defined the essence of Dolce Thornton Park. To our patrons, thank you for allowing us to be a part of your lives and for creating a vibrant community around our tables"

A LA CART 2 NOW OPEN

A La Cart, the popular food truck/ craft beer garden in The Milk District, has opened a sister space on Michigan south of downtown Orlando. The new venue has seven trucks at the moment, multiple bars, way more seating, and air-conditioned bathrooms. Get there before all the young families take it over.

The former home of 4 Rivers Smokehouse in the bottom floor of City Hall has a newish tenant that we forgot to tell you about. The new City Beautiful Cafe, owned by AJ Campofiore of Bem Bom on Corrine, is knocking out some amazing lunch options in his new home that everyone should carve out some time to try for themselves. They're only open for breakfast and lunch service and close

They serve a variety of easy breakfast items like breakfast tacos, pancakes, and vegan burritos, but their Cali Style sandwich with chicken cutlets, avocado, and alleged pixie dust is something you need to try for yourself.

ORLANDO RESTAURATEURS AND FOODPRENEURS ARE RAKING IN THE AWARDS THIS SEASON

California-based travel guide company Fodor's Travel (not to be confused with the saddest Game of Thrones character ever) has just released its top 10 favorite Orlando restaurants in 2024, drawing even more attention to local stars like Kaya, Prato, Soseki, Kabooki Sushi, and Bombay Street Kitchen, among others.

Fodor writer Terry Ward summed up their experience of The City Beautiful by saying,

"From fine dining spots at five-star resorts near Walt Disney World and Universal Orlando that have earned their Michelin stars to hideaways in the city's Mills 50 district—a hotbed for Southeast Asian and omakase—it's all about being surprised by the breadth and depth of Orlando's cuisine scene."

Ward isn't alone in his appreciation either. Kaya, the casual fine dining Filipino restaurant and bar in Mills 50 earned itself a place in the finals for this year's James Beard Awards too, for Best New Restaurant - along with 30 other restaurants across the country. And while we have to wait until June 10 to hear if they win, this is the first time an Orlando restaurant has ever made the James Beard Finals in any category, let alone Best New Restaurant. And new they are; they only opened in 2022.

And then there's the Michelin Guide, right? Michelin Guide added four new starred venues to its growing list of recognized Orlando restaurants last month, including Camille, Natsu, Papa Llama, and Victoria and Albert's.

LOCAL BREWERY RELEASES NEW THC-INFUSED SELTZERS

Tactical Brewing in Baldwin Park celebrated 4/20 this year with a special seltzer release that nobody was expecting.

Cloud Nine is the name of a new THC-infused seltzer brand that Tactical launched over the weekend, using Delta 9 THC. Delta 9 is derived from hemp and doesn't exceed 0.3%, which makes it legal in Florida, even without a medical card. And it still gets you buzzed. There are currently two flavors: strawberry kiwi – 2mg Delta 9 THC and pineapple mango – 3.5 mg Delta 9 THC. They have no sugars, use natural flavors, are 0 calories, and are gluten-free.

Drinking one of these seltzers will have you test positive for THC though, so take a moment to review your work's drug policies before consuming.

RETRO RECIPE - LEMON SYLLABUB



"Lemon syllabub" isn't just fun to say, but it's also super-tasty. Syllabubs were sweet frothy drinks that were popular between the 16th and 19th centuries and they were made with milk or cream, that were curdled with wine, cider, or some other acidic liquid, then sweetened and flavored. Obviously when ice cream became more readily available, the syllabub started to disappear.

Ingredients

- 1 cup heavy whipping cream, chilled
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1/4 cup white wine
- 1/8 cup fresh lemon juice
- -1 teaspon grated lemon zest
- -1/4 teaspon ground nutmeg (or to taste) -Fresh mint leaves and lemon slices for garnish

Preparation

Whip the cream and sugar in a chilled bowl until the cream begins to thicken. Gradually whip in the white wine, lemon juice, and lemon zest. Continue to whip until light and fluffy, but not grainy. Cover the mixture and chill until serving time.

Serve in chilled parfait glasses, garnished with a dash of nutmeg, a spring of mint, and a slice of lemon. Syllabubs should be eaten with a teeny tiny spoon and savored slowly.


